

2024 DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD RECIPIENT

Adam Currie

BBA '12

Adam Currie's eye for talent and passion for building community emerged early in his Bachelor of Business Administration and Certificate in Professional Communications program at the University of the Fraser Valley (UFV), from which he graduated in 2012. His career has been marked by a focus on fostering leadership and driving growth, even in challenging circumstances.

During his time at UFV, Adam co-founded the Human Resources Student Society, a pivotal step that shaped his career. He and others in the society played a vital role in encouraging first-year students to explore the field of human resources, driving greater interest that led to many new students enrolling in the program the first semester after the society was founded.

Adam's leadership journey took him to key roles at Korn Ferry and Kal Tire, where he refined his expertise in talent acquisition and executive leadership. His ability to excel in these roles led to his appointment as Regional Vice-President of Executive Search at Optimum Talent, a Canadian national search firm. His leadership helped expand the company before its acquisition in 2020

Following his many progressive roles, Adam founded VX Search Group Inc., an executive search consultancy that he grew to generate \$1 million in revenue. His entrepreneurial success caught the attention of TMG Search Canada, a division of The Mullings Group, which later acquired VX Search Group.

In late 2020, while in the midst of building VX Group, Adam faced an unexpected and serious challenge when he contracted Lyme disease. Despite grappling with debilitating symptoms and enduring a long, complex healthcare journey, he remarkably continued to grow his business. His experiences seeking treatment, working with healthcare professionals, and overcoming his illness led to a desire to be part of influencing the healing journeys of other patients. He set his sights on public health and was recruited to Fraser Health Authority (FHA) as Director of Executive & Senior Leadership Acquisition in 2023.

In his role at FHA, Adam leads a team responsible for recruiting senior leaders and physicians for the largest health authority in British Columbia. His team consistently surpasses hiring targets, helping Fraser Health attract top talent while navigating the ever-evolving healthcare landscape. Under Adam's leadership, his team has filled over 150 senior leader roles and successfully recruited more than 500 physicians, maintaining Fraser Health's position as a leading healthcare provider in the region.

Adam is also deeply committed to community service. He has been a champion for Indigenous employment initiatives, partnering with First Nations communities across Canada to create pathways to employment in various sectors. His dedication to diversity and inclusion extends to supporting LGBTQ2+ causes and volunteering with organizations like the Okanagan Science Centre and the Shuswap Community Foundation, where he serves as a director.

Adam's leadership style is characterized by a genuine desire to understand and support those around him. He is known for his ability to create space for diverse perspectives and foster a sense of belonging in both his professional and volunteer work. This approach has not only led to his success but has also made a lasting impact on the communities and people he serves.

Walking into Longhouse Branding and Marketing, the values instilled by founder Keenan Beavis are immediately evident. The office buzzes with a team of nearly 15 people, working collaboratively in one large open space – reflecting the long-standing traditions of the Stó:lō People, who have done so for generations in their longhouses. Keenan is an up-and-coming leader in the business and marketing world, and his tremendous impact has earned him the University of the Fraser Valley's (UFV) Young Distinguished Alumni Award.

Keenan's entrepreneurial spirit began when he was very young. At just four years old, he went door to door offering backyard bugs to his neighbours. By seventh grade, he had built the 27th most-viewed YouTube channel in Canada, using search engine optimization (SEO) so his videos would rank high in the search algorithm. Then, in high school, Keenan navigated unchartered waters with his successful online t-shirt store, "PokéShop." Today, he channels his entrepreneurial energy into growing businesses while also pursuing Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu training.

After graduating with a Bachelor of Business Administration in Finance and a minor in Economics, Keenan embarked on a career fueled by a vision for the future, where leaders can focus on the needs that have the most impact.

"Business and community leaders can get stuck wearing a lot of hats. Longhouse will simplify your to-do list; allowing you to

Keenan founded the company in 2017 with a focus on delivering web design, graphic design, video production and digital marketing solutions that help businesses grow. During the pandemic, when many businesses struggled, Keenan pivoted from video production, which made up 35% of Longhouse's revenue, to focus on digital advertising and SEO. This shift led to a remarkable 380% growth, helping Longhouse add jobs and support over 500 businesses, generating an estimated \$335 million in revenue across 84 industries.

Beyond his role at Longhouse, Keenan is passionate about entrepreneurship. He regularly speaks at business events, sharing his journey and insights to inspire other entrepreneurs and leaders. Along with his own ventures in the business community, Keenan has served on the board of the Black Business Association of BC, volunteers at UFV and is beginning a new role as a director for the Downtown Langley Business Association's board.

Keenan is dedicated to empowering the next generation of Indigenous business leaders. He established the Longhouse Indigenous Youth Mentorship Award, which provides Indigenous youth with financial support and entrepreneurship training. The scholarship was founded on the principle of giving back. The award includes in-person workshops at the Longhouse office, covering web design, digital advertising and graphic design, equipping young entrepreneurs with valuable skills for their future.

Keenan's work has earned significant recognition. He was named as one of B.C. Business magazine's 30 under 30, highlighting young entrepreneurs making an industry impact. He has also been nominated for an Abbotsford Chamber of Commerce Award and received the Young Indigenous Entrepreneur of the Year Award from the B.C. Achievement Foundation, honouring his contributions to business and commitment to Indigenous entrepreneurship.

OUTSTANDING STUDENT LEADER AWARD RECIPIENT Jada McIntyre BSW '24

Jada McIntyre's passion for inclusion and advocacy emerged in the early days of her Bachelor of Social Work studies at the University of the Fraser Valley (UFV). Surrounded by the community of her Social Work cohort, Jada's experiences at UFV were marked by a focus on supporting her peers, fostering inclusive environments, and leading by example.

Jada's leadership journey began in October 2021 when she joined UFV's Wellness Centre as a volunteer. Her involvement quickly expanded; in 2022, she became a Student Assistant and later advanced to Peer Case Manager Assistant. In this role, Jada helped develop UFV's Peer Case Management program, shaping training models now shared with universities across Canada and the U.S. She supervised peers and mentored them in inclusive leadership, ensuring that students facing personal and academic challenges felt supported and empowered.

During her time at UFV, Jada's dedication to community service was evident in her volunteer work. Through UFV's "In This Together" program, Jada led workshops on preventing sexualized violence, facilitating vital conversations about consent and trauma-informed care. Her ability to engage students with patience and empathy made her a key figure in fostering a safer, more inclusive campus environment.

During her practicum at Fraser Health's Mental Health and Substance Use Centre, Jada supported adults experiencing mental health challenges, applying her academic knowledge to real-world scenarios. She further demonstrated her leadership by organizing a food drive for the UFV-SUS Food Bank, ensuring that students in need received essential support.



"My time at UFV gave me the foundational knowledge to succeed not just professionally, but also as a human being," Jada reflected. Her academic excellence earned her a place on the Dean's List, but it was her leadership, volunteerism, and commitment to advocacy that left a lasting impact on UFV's campus.

Balancing her academics, volunteer work, and role as a Peer Case Manager Assistant demanded resilience and determination. Her ability to navigate these demands with grace and compassion inspired those around her. She was known for creating spaces where all students felt valued, heard, and supported — a testament to her leadership style rooted in empathy and inclusivity.

Jada's leadership didn't just impact her peers — it shaped the future of UFV's student community. Her contributions to the Peer Assist Program, her dedication to mental health advocacy, and her tireless efforts to support students facing challenges set a high standard for future student leaders.

Having completed her degree in June 2024, Jada has embarked on her social work career. Her legacy at UFV continues to inspire; her commitment to fostering inclusive communities and advocating for those in need made a lasting impact, proving that true leadership is about lifting others up and creating positive change.

The weekend also marked the conclusion of a year of 50th anniversary celebrations. At an alumni reception on Friday night, Dr. Joanne MacLean, UFV President and Vice-Chancellor, reflected on the vital role alumni play in shaping the university's future.

"One thing is clear. UFV's future will be shaped by all of you," she said. "Our alumni are not just part of our past — they are essential to what comes next.
